Principal Readings:

1st Reading: Amos 5: 18-24

Alas for you who desire the day of the LORD!
Why do you want the day of the LORD?
It is darkness, not light;
as if someone fled from a lion,
and was met by a bear;
or went into the house and rested a hand against the
wall,

and was bitten by a snake. Is not the day of the LORD darkness, not light, and gloom with no brightness in it?

I hate, I despise your festivals, and I take no delight in your solemn assemblies. Even though you offer me your burnt-offerings and grain-offerings,

I will not accept them; and the offerings of well-being of your fatted animals I will not look upon.

Take away from me the noise of your songs; I will not listen to the melody of your harps.

But let justice roll down like waters, and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream.

2nd Reading: 1 Thessalonians 4.13-18

We do not want you to be uninformed, brothers and sisters, about those who have died, so that you may not grieve as others do who have no hope. For since we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so, through Jesus, God will bring with him those who have died. For this we declare to you by the word of the Lord, that we who are alive, who are left until the coming of the Lord, will by no means precede those who have died. For the Lord himself, with a cry of command, with the archangel's call and with the sound of God's trumpet, will descend from heaven, and the dead in Christ will rise first. Then we who are alive, who are left, will be caught up in the clouds together with them to meet the Lord in the air; and so we will be with the Lord for ever. Therefore encourage one another with these words.

Gospel: Matthew 25.1-13

Jesus spoke this parable to the disciples: 'The kingdom of heaven will be like this. Ten bridesmaids took their lamps and went to meet the bridegroom. Five of them were foolish, and five were wise. When the foolish took their lamps, they took no oil with them; but the wise took flasks of oil with their lamps. As the bridegroom was delayed, all of them became drowsy and slept. But at midnight there was a shout, "Look! Here is the bridegroom! Come out to meet him." Then all those bridesmaids got up and trimmed their lamps. The foolish said to the wise, "Give us some of your oil, for our lamps are going out." But the wise replied, "No! there will not be enough for you and for us; you had better go to the dealers and buy some for yourselves." And while they went to buy it, the bridegroom came, and those who were ready went with him into the wedding banquet; and the door was shut. Later the other bridesmaids came also, saying, "Lord, lord, open to us." But he replied, "Truly I tell you, I do not know you." Keep awake therefore, for you know neither the day nor the hour.'

Reflection from Sue Plant

The fate of the unprepared bridesmaids seems harsh. After all they had no idea when the bridegroom would come (surely poor behaviour on the part of a host) and they were no doubt very tired of waiting. We all know life has many instances when it is hard to maintain a state of readiness. When we came home from Aden as a service family in 1966 our flight was delayed on three consecutive days, and each time we had to fish our old clothes out of the dustbin, as everything else, other than our winter clothes for travelling, had already been sent to luggage handling. It was tedious. War has this same sense of tedium. Often soldiers sat for days in the trenches attempting to stay alert and ready for action between assaults, as did civilians under bomb barrage both in the Blitz, and in war-torn countries now.

In such circumstances it is easy to slip into feeling powerless. However, as Christians we accept we live under God's authority. He is our hope when all else is grey. He calls us to be prepared and to live that life under his authority, not just on Sundays, but every day. Sometimes it can seem a thankless duty. At the moment life seems complicated. Everything needs to be planned. There is no longer a quick dash to the shops without thinking beforehand whether we are prepared. We need to make those preparations not just for ourselves but also to safeguard others. Those actions form part of our calling to love our neighbours. If we don't put in the work to ensure we are prepared we fall short on that great commandment. Like the careless bridesmaids, we can hardly expect our invitation to the feast if we fail.

This Sunday is the *Third Before Advent* and we are once again in lock-down. On this day I think this prayer by Janet Morley from her collection *All Desires Known*, speaks to us clearly:

God our desire, whose coming we look for, but whose arrival is unexpected: here in the darkness make us urgent to greet you, and open yourself to our longing that we may be known by you through Jesus Christ. **Amen**.

Poem by Robert Laurence Binyon (1869-1943), published in *The Times* newspaper on 21 September 1914.



With proud thanksgiving, a mother for her children, England mourns for her dead across the sea. Flesh of her flesh they were, spirit of her spirit, Fallen in the cause of the free.

Solemn the drums thrill: Death august and royal Sings sorrow up into immortal spheres. There is music in the midst of desolation And a glory that shines upon our tears.

They went with songs to the battle, they were young, Straight of limb, true of eye, steady and aglow. They were staunch to the end against odds uncounted, They fell with their faces to the foe.

They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old: Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning We will remember them.

They mingle not with their laughing comrades again; They sit no more at familiar tables of home; They have no lot in our labour of the day-time; They sleep beyond England's foam.

But where our desires are and our hopes profound, Felt as a well-spring that is hidden from sight, To the innermost heart of their own land they are known As the stars are known to the Night;

As the stars that shall be bright when we are dust, Moving in marches upon the heavenly plain, As the stars that are starry in the time of our darkness, To the end, to the end, they remain.
