Principal Readings:

1st Reading: Jeremiah 31: 31-34

The days are surely coming, says the Lord, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah. It will not be like the covenant that I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt—a covenant that they broke, though I was their husband, says the Lord. But this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the Lord: I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people. No longer shall they teach one another, or say to each other, 'Know the Lord', for they shall all know me, from the least of them to the greatest, says the Lord; for I will forgive their iniquity, and remember their sin no more.

2nd Reading: Hebrews 5: 5-10

So also Christ did not glorify himself in becoming a high priest, but was appointed by the one who said to him, 'You are my Son, today I have begotten you'; as he says also in another place, 'You are a priest for ever, according to the order of Melchizedek.'

In the days of his flesh, Jesus offered up prayers and supplications, with loud cries and tears, to the one who was able to save him from death, and he was heard because of his reverent submission. Although he was a Son, he learned obedience through what he suffered; and having been made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him, having been designated by God a high priest according to the order of Melchizedek.

Gospel: *John 12: 20-33*

Now among those who went up to worship at the festival were some Greeks. They came to Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee, and said to him, 'Sir, we wish to see Jesus.' Philip went and told Andrew; then Andrew and Philip went and told Jesus. Jesus answered them, 'The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit. Those who love their life lose it, and those who hate their life in this world will keep it for eternal life. Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there will my servant be also. Whoever serves me, the Father will honour.

'Now my soul is troubled. And what should I say—
"Father, save me from this hour"? No, it is for this
reason that I have come to this hour. Father, glorify your
name.' Then a voice came from heaven, 'I have
glorified it, and I will glorify it again.' The crowd
standing there heard it and said that it was thunder.
Others said, 'An angel has spoken to him.' Jesus
answered, 'This voice has come for your sake, not for
mine. Now is the judgement of this world; now the ruler
of this world will be driven out. And I, when I am lifted
up from the earth, will draw all people to myself.' He
said this to indicate the kind of death he was to die.

Reflection from Sue

During the pandemic we have all reflected upon what is important in our lives. For many of us we might feel a real watershed has been reached: *that was then, this is now*. Maybe that experience has had an effect upon the way certain Bible passages inform our lives.

At the moment we face a lot of information from the government and its advisers that is hard to hear. This was also the case for Jesus and his audience. The man who had given them hope of a better future, and had performed miracles was warning them the end followed a very different path to the one they envisaged. Some of them stopped listening.

To those who remained Jesus told one of his most powerful parables, about the grain of wheat. He said that for the seed to grow and bring forth new life, it first had to be buried in the ground and to all intents and purposes appear to die. Jesus knew once he entered Jerusalem he was bound for the cross. But he also knew the ending to the story. One thing followed another. Just as the grain led to the ear of wheat which led to the flour which led to the bread, so Jesus' death led to his resurrection as the bread of life. It was part of God's plan.

Often Bible parables seem remote from our contemporary lives, which are not based upon an agricultural economy. However, this year many people might find this metaphor strikes more of a chord. We all remember the empty flour shelves in the supermarket because so many took up home baking at the start of lockdown. I remember a spokesman for Shipton Mill speaking about the difficulty of obtaining small bags to package flour to cope with demand. A couple of weeks ago he was on the news again (and by the way other flour brands are available) saying their trade had risen by a factor of 3 over the past year. Imagine all those grains, grown from buried seeds crushed into flour, and all those people making bread. If ever a story is going to speak to us meaningfully, surely this is the time.
