Principal Readings:

1st Reading: Acts 3: 12-19

When Peter saw it, he addressed the people, 'You Israelites, why do you wonder at this, or why do you stare at us, as though by our own power or piety we had made him walk? The God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, the God of our ancestors has glorified his servant Jesus, whom you handed over and rejected in the presence of Pilate, though he had decided to release him. But you rejected the Holy and Righteous One and asked to have a murderer given to you, and you killed the Author of life, whom God raised from the dead. To this we are witnesses. And by faith in his name, his name itself has made this man strong, whom you see and know; and the faith that is through Jesus has given him this perfect health in the presence of all of you.

'And now, friends, I know that you acted in ignorance, as did also your rulers. In this way God fulfilled what he had foretold through all the prophets, that his Messiah would suffer. Repent therefore, and turn to God so that your sins may be wiped out.

2nd Reading: 1 John 3: 1-7

See what love the Father has given us, that we should be called children of God; and that is what we are. The reason the world does not know us is that it did not know him. Beloved, we are God's children now; what we will be has not yet been revealed. What we do know is this: when he is revealed, we will be like him, for we will see him as he is. And all who have this hope in him purify themselves, just as he is pure.

Everyone who commits sin is guilty of lawlessness; sin is lawlessness. You know that he was revealed to take away sins, and in him there is no sin. No one who abides in him sins; no one who sins has either seen him or known him. Little children, let no one deceive you. Everyone who does what is right is righteous, just as he is righteous.

Gospel: Luke 24: 36b-48

While they were talking about this, Jesus himself stood among them and said to them, 'Peace be with you.' They were startled and terrified, and thought that they were seeing a ghost. He said to them, 'Why are you frightened, and why do doubts arise in your hearts? Look at my hands and my feet; see that it is I myself. Touch me and see; for a ghost does not have flesh and bones as you see that I have.' And when he had said this, he showed them his hands and his feet. While in their joy they were disbelieving and still wondering, he said to them, 'Have you anything here to eat?' They gave him a piece of broiled fish, and he took it and ate in their presence.

Then he said to them, 'These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you—that everything written about me in the law of Moses, the prophets, and the psalms must be fulfilled.' Then he opened their minds to understand the scriptures, and he said to them, 'Thus it is written, that the Messiah is to suffer and to rise from the dead on the third day, and that repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things.

Reflection from Cookie

The Acts reading this week tackles the subject of being people surprised at events which they had been party to. We see Peter and John involved in the healing of a 'lame man' and then addressing the crowd asking them why they were surprised at the events they have just seen unfold..

Sometimes we have those sorts of moments. This week, we are remembering the Royal family who, although they were expecting a sad event to happen in the none too distant future, undoubtedly were not prepared for it when it arrived. Can we ever be? Are we ever ready for the death of a loved one?

I have had the privilege to be involved in the care of two funeral families over the past few weeks. One family were expecting the death of a loved one and yet for the other, it was so unexpected and sudden. Both families are grieving in their own way and we offer prayers and support as often as possible. But the point is, we just do not ever know what is around the corner, or what lies just out of sight. Life has a habit of throwing a curve ball at us when we least expect it.

As we move out of the Easter season, I am still reminded of the emotions which must have stormed through the disciple's hearts and minds. Christ was there, then he was gone, then he was there again. Curve ball after curve ball.

The Christian journey is a bit like that to be fair. It has highs and it has lows. There are no guarantees of an easy ride, but we are told God will never leave or forsake us – whatever life – or death throws at us.

I have been really blessed by the lovely letters and thoughts of encouragement you have been sending and also the words telling us where we can do better. Please, keep them coming in as we continue until the end of the month with our consultation process. One person stands out for what they said and I would like to share this with you. This person said, "I need to do better, as I have a very small faith." I wrote back to this person and said, "Jesus has a lot to say about what you can do with faith that is even the size of a mustard seed." And we all know the saying "that from a tiny acorn...." So, if any of you are wondering, small or tiny faith is good (luckily for Doubting Thomas, luckily for me!!) We do not have to have it all sorted. We come as we are, here and now, warts and all.

Be encouraged dear friends, small or tiny faith is good. Small or tiny is enough.
