Collect:

Almighty God,

whose Son Jesus Christ is the resurrection and the life: raise us, who trust in him,

from the death of sin to the life of righteousness, that we may seek those things which are above, where he reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

or

Risen Christ, faithful shepherd of your Father's sheep: teach us to hear your voice and to follow your command, that all your people may be gathered into one flock, to the glory of God the Father.

Principal Readings:

1st Reading: Acts 4: 5-12

The next day their rulers, elders, and scribes assembled in Jerusalem, with Annas the high priest, Caiaphas, John, and Alexander, and all who were of the high-priestly family. When they had made the prisoners stand in their midst, they inquired, 'By what power or by what name did you do this?' Then Peter, filled with the Holy Spirit, said to them, 'Rulers of the people and elders, if we are questioned today because of a good deed done to someone who was sick and are asked how this man has been healed, let it be known to all of you, and to all the people of Israel, that this man is standing before you in good health by the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, whom you crucified, whom God raised from the dead. This Jesus is

"the stone that was rejected by you, the builders; it has become the cornerstone."

There is salvation in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given among mortals by which we must be saved.'

2nd Reading: 1 John 3: 16-end

We know love by this, that he laid down his life for us—and we ought to lay down our lives for one another. How does God's love abide in anyone who has the world's goods and sees a brother or sister in need and yet refuses help?

Little children, let us love, not in word or speech, but in truth and action. And by this we will know that we are from the truth and will reassure our hearts before him whenever our hearts condemn us; for God is greater than our hearts, and he knows everything. Beloved, if our hearts do not condemn us, we have boldness before God; and we receive from him whatever we ask, because we obey his commandments and do what pleases him.

And this is his commandment, that we should believe in the name of his Son Jesus Christ and love one another, just as he has commanded us. All who obey his commandments abide in him, and he abides in them. And by this we know that he abides in us, by the Spirit that he has given us.

Gospel: John 10: 11-18

'I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. The hired hand, who is not the shepherd and does not own the sheep, sees the wolf coming and leaves the sheep and runs away—and the wolf snatches them and scatters them. The hired hand runs away because a hired hand does not care for the sheep. I am the good shepherd. I know my own and my own know me, just as the Father knows me and I know the Father. And I lay down my life for the sheep. I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold. I must bring them also, and they will listen to my voice. So there will be one flock, one shepherd. For this reason the Father loves me, because I lay down my life in order to take it up again. No one takes it from me, but I lay it down of my own accord. I have power to lay it down, and I have power to take it up again. I have received this command from my Father.'

Reflection from Peter

North Nibley is, or used to be, full of farms with livestock in the fields so I expect you have all been, at some time, in close proximity to a flock of sheep. They look relaxed, pristine and woolly at a distance, but as you get closer and closer you will notice the odd squabble going on, everyone running after the one who thinks she's found the greenest blade of grass, and then there is that distinguished sheepy smell that is accompanied by flies, dingy sheep posteriors, and the odd case of foot rot. That is what a flock of sheep is like close up and that is what we, members of Christ's flock, are like. Just as the sheep in our fields are, well, just sheep and all very much alike, so are we, well, unclean sinners and all very much alike. But none the less, Jesus Christ, our shepherd loves each one of us dearly.

Now, in biblical times, shepherds were willing to give up their lives in order to protect the flock because if they didn't take their work extremely seriously, they would have to answer to their employers which probably meant a good flogging at the very least and starvation due to a lack of employment. I'm not sure if our local shepherds are willing to give up their lives for their flock but that is exactly what Jesus, our Shepherd did for us. He didn't need to, he could have escaped death if he had wanted to and remember that he thought about it when he prayed, 'God take this cup from me' but he didn't. Jesus did give up his life for us so that we could be members of his flock even though we are, as I have said, akin to a silly, smelly old flock of sheep on a hot summer's day. In addition to all of this, Jesus also made it clear that his work was not complete, in that there were other sheep that he must bring into the fold. It wasn't just for the locals.

Now, on the subject of giving up our lives for something, we'd all probably give up a kidney or perhaps a lung for our children but probably not two. On the other hand, the news this past year has been full of people giving up their lives whilst nursing victims of Coved because that's what they are trained for and they aren't about to relinquish their Hippocratic Oath in the hope that they themselves will escape the virus.

Our homework for this week is to pray diligently to God for a Faith so strong that we are prepared to give up our own life, our sinful ways and often judgmental outlook that leads us to think that we are somehow more important to God than others. Do we really care and love the other sheep that we meet in our daily lives who are totally unknown to us? Are we willing to change our outlook and ways in order to totally encompass them and encourage them to turn to Jesus the Shepherd? It is a huge, big sacrifice on our part but that is what it means to be a disciple.
