This morning, I welcomed the children as they walked up the frost covered path on their way up to Blue Coat Primary School. We are now in the depths of winter, with the memories of Christmas having been left behind. However, the joy and enthusiasm that children bring with them every day warms our hearts and souls. Where we see the inconvenience of scraping cars, they show us the wonder and excitement that God's creation brings. We all feel very privileged to see the world through children's eyes when we are with them.

There has been plenty of learning taking place in the first few days and weeks of school. Each class is engrossed in the topics and areas on which they are currently focusing. In Milepost 1 (Years and 2), they have recently taken a flight to Kenya! This was all done from the comfort of their own classroom. The children had their own boarding passes in order to board their (virtual) flight to the East African country. A thrilling video clip was used to bring this experience to life for them. This was the "hook" to draw children in to their Geography topic where the children learn about a contrasting environment.

The curriculum at Blue Coat is a designed to prepare the children to be "future ready". We use a problem based learning curriculum, which involves a problem (or a hook) which is used to give the children a real life context for their learning that inspires them to learn (like the "flight" to Kenya). The children then tell us what they know about the topic already and what they would like to find out. Then, the teachers model with the children what they are going to learn in the coming weeks. The problem is revisited at the end of the topic. We believe that this means that our children see a purpose in learning, are excited by the topics and are also taught how to plan themselves when they want to find out about a specific area. In future, our children should be experts in planning how to find out more about something that they are interested in, as well as having all the skills needed to revise in readiness for exams and beyond.

We love it when our children contribute to our curriculum. In Milepost 3 (Years 5 and 6) Jenson used his expertise to teach the others. Jenson is one of the best racers in the country – currently he races in the IAME Cadet category, nationally. When his class were learning about friction, Jenson brought in the brake pads from his kart and explained how they use friction to slow down. This really brought the learning to life for the others and is something that we love to see here at Blue Coat Primary School.

In Milepost 2 (Years 3 and 4), the children have been learning about Black History in their History topic. We think that this is really important for us,

especially because of the make-up of our school. To be "future ready" we want our children to know about the achievements of people like Mary Seacole and Walter Tull. It was great to see the children celebrating diversity and recognizing the contribution of Black History to our country and our world.

In the coming days, some children will be going to the Christingle Service. These are children selected from our inspirational Ignite Club, which we have spoken about previously. This is going to take place with Bishop Rachel at Gloucester Cathedral on January the 22nd. We enjoy supporting The Children's Society in this annual event.

We have plenty more in the pipeline at Blue Coat Primary School. Next week Class Discovery will be going to The Egg Theatre in Bath to watch Snow Mouse, among many other great experiences. This keeps every day an adventure for us all. As ever, Blue Coat is an exciting place for children and adults alike.

The IMB at HMP Leyhill

The Independent Monitoring Board (IMB) at HMP Leyhill is looking for new members.

HMP Leyhill is situated at Tortworth, close to Junction 14 of the M5 and caters for adult male prisoners mainly being prepared for release and resettlement. It's an Open prison, on an attractive rural site.

The IMB monitoring team are members of the general public who are totally independent of the Prison and Probation Service. The purpose of their monitoring is to check that proper standards of care and decency are maintained and that prisoners are being prepared for release by an effective programme of rehabilitation and resettlement. Their role is very different from that of Prison Visitors

The Board has access to HMP Leyhill at any time of day or night. Members observe all parts of the prison, talking to prisoners and staff and monitoring all aspects of prison life. Individual members monitor remotely or by visiting 1 or 2 times a month. The Board meets monthly and discusses current issues with the Prison Governor.

The Board is required to submit an Annual Report to the Secretary of State for Justice. The report focuses on Safety, Humane Treatment, Health & Wellbeing, Progression and Release. The report receives a detailed response and is subsequently published.

For someone wanting to get involved in their local community, this is an ideal opportunity to do something a little bit different, potentially challenging and undoubtedly vitally important. The IMB acts as an independent voice in a closed community.

This is a voluntary role for which all necessary training is provided, travel expenses and in some cases loss of earnings and childcare/carer costs are paid. Applicants need to be over 18 and should live within 45 minutes travel time of the prison. Members come from all walks of life and formal qualifications are not required. Once an Application form has been completed and submitted, all candidates will be invited to make a preliminary visit to the prison prior to interview. The recruitment campaign starts on Monday 14th February 2022 and completed applications must be submitted by Sunday 27th March 2022. On 7 February 1952 a 25-year-old Princess Elizabeth was on holiday in Kenya when she learned of the death of her Father, instantly elevating her to Queen, although the Coronation didn't take place until 2 June 1953.

Wotton is making plans to celebrate her long and faithful reign, and the churches are not going to be left out! At the very least there will be a Service, probably along the lines of Songs of Praise, and a chance to give thanks to God.

The whole Platinum Jubilee weekend will, we hope, be a celebration, but it is on **Sunday 5 June** that the Service will take place. And there will be room for all! More details in due course.

Archbishop Desmond Tutu 7 October 1931 - 26 December 2021



In conversation with Nelson Mandela, 2008

Desmond Mpilo Tutu was born in a small gold-mining town in what was then the Transvaal. He first followed in his father's footsteps as a teacher, but left after the passage of the Bantu Education Act in 1953 which introduced racial segregation in schools.

He joined the church and was strongly influenced by many white clergymen in the country, especially another strong opponent of apartheid, Bishop Trevor Huddleston.

Never afraid to speak out against injustice, he was also prepared to take direct action, showing no fear of arrest or imprisonment: he stressed however that his motives were religious, not political.

The BBC obituary says: 'He was witty, and his conversation was frequently punctuated by high-pitched chuckles. But beyond this, he was a man of impeccably strong moral convictions who strove to bring about a peaceful South Africa.'

Since his death many of his quotes have been circulating on social media and elsewhere. Below are a few.

- We may be surprised at the people we find in heaven. God has a soft spot for sinners. His standards are quite low.
- Do your little bit of good where you are; it's those little bits of good put

together that overwhelm the world.

- Differences are not intended to separate, to alienate. We are different precisely in order to realise our need of one another.
- When the missionaries came to Africa they had the Bible and we had the land. They said "Let us pray." We closed our eyes. When we opened them we had the Bible and they had the land.
- If you are neutral in situations of injustice, you have chosen the side of the oppressor. If an elephant has its foot on the tail of a mouse, and you say that you are neutral, the mouse will not appreciate your neutrality.
- My father always used to say, "Don't raise your voice. Improve your argument." Good sense does not always lie with the loudest shouters, nor can we say that a large, unruly crowd is always the best arbiter of what is right.
- We learn from history that we don't learn from history.
- Forgiving is not forgetting; its actually remembering--remembering and not using your right to hit back. Its a second chance for a new beginning. And the remembering part is particularly important. Especially if you don't want to repeat what happened.
- Language is very powerful. Language does not just describe reality.
 Language creates the reality it describes.
- A person is a person through other persons; you can't be human in isolation; you are human only in relationships.
- There comes a point where we need to stop just pulling people out of the river. We need to go upstream and find out why they're falling in.

We give thanks to God for the life, work and witness of Desmond Tutu.

Say 'No' to Floral Foam

Floral foam,or Oasis has been around for 60 years and is wonderful for holding flower stalks firm to get your flowers arranged just where you want them.

It's clever stuff; lightweight when dry but will hold up to 50 times its weight of water, easy to cut and shape to fit those awkward vases.

However it's made from synthetic, non-recyclable plastic and is created using a combination of carbon black, formaldehyde and phenolic foam, which are all toxic. It's non-recyclable and will not decompose, merely breaking down into smaller and smaller micro-plastic particles

As with all micro-plastics, these filter into the oceans where they are ingested by marine life and so enter the food chain.

The RHS has banned the use of foam at their shows so I am sure we in Wotton's churches can do so. The alternatives? Balled chicken wire; glass beads; use a kenzan (one of those spiky things), bendy twigs ...

We are told to never tip water down the drain that has had oasis in it - strain it then put the water in a hole in the garden and send all the Oasis to landfill.

As Churches we need to take a lead in looking after God's creation and as Desmond Tutu said (page ix): 'Do your little bit of good where you are ...'
