I am honoured to have been asked to write in this month's edition of this newsletter on behalf of Blue Coat. First, a little introduction about myself, I am Mr Evans one of the newest additions to the Blue Coat teaching staff, having started in September. I teach in Milepost 2 and have been incredibly fortunate to teach and hopefully inspire the young minds of Wotton-under-Edge.

It has been a month or so of transition for Blue Coat, from winter into spring and with the fortunately dry weather we have been having, summer is not too far around the corner. For Blue Coat, it is a time of happiness and hope as the warm air starts to get filled with bird song, insects and the laughter of the children enjoying the outdoor spaces. Mr Haynes is working ten to a dozen making sure the school site is looking at its glorious best, whilst Mrs Wharin and her team of play coordinators are making sure that playtimes and lunchtimes are full of outdoor learning through play and exploration.

In the classrooms, Year 6s are preparing incredibly well for the up-and-coming SATs whilst the rest of the school are starting the summer term with a skip in their step, hungry for learning after a restful Easter Holidays. To give an example of this, in Milepost 2, we are making the most of the weather by basing both our English and our Art about the great outdoors. We are studying Andy Goldsworthy, the land-art based sculptor in Art, designing and making our own sculptures using natural materials from the great-outdoors. Running alongside this, we are studying poetry in English, reading the likes of Joseph Coelho, Pie Corbett, and Michael Rosen. Our final piece of writing aims to be a nature inspired shaped poem taking inspiration from the school site.

The students of Blue Coat have been incredibly busy outside of school as well as in, we have had representatives in local hockey and football finals, as well as competitions from further afield. During our Star Achievers assemblies on a Friday afternoon, the hall is full of children wanting to share their achievements from their activities away from class. This is incredibly refreshing to see after what has been a very tough few years on children's involvement in out-of-school activities.

As a new teacher to the school and the area, I have found Blue Coat and Wotton-under-Edge to be an incredibly welcoming community. There is a real sense of community from the overwhelming attendance of the iSingPop concert to the smiles and waves from residents when walking the children through the town. It has been a pleasure to get to know the town and I am excited to see where the rest of the summer term takes us as a school community.

### The Queen's Platinum Jubilee Celebrations Thursday 2 - Sunday 5 June 2022

So, if 'together in Wotton' is about the Churches and the Christians in Wotton, what is all this fuss about the Queen?

Well, The Sovereign holds the title 'Defender of the Faith and Supreme Governor of the Church of England'. These titles date back to the reign of King Henry VIII, who was initially granted the title 'Defender of the Faith' in 1521 by Pope Leo X. When Henry VIII renounced the spiritual authority of the Papacy in 1534 he was proclaimed 'supreme head on earth' of the Church of England. This was repealed by Queen Mary I but reinstated during the reign of Queen Elizabeth I, who was proclaimed 'Supreme Governor' of the Church of England.

The Queen's relationship with the Church of England was symbolised at the Coronation in 1953 when Her Majesty was anointed by the Archbishop of Canterbury and took an oath to "maintain and preserve inviolably the settlement of the Church of England, and the doctrine worship, discipline, and government thereof, as by law established in England".

There is no doubt that Queen Elizabeth has lived and served by Christian principles and she makes no secret of her deep Christian faith. She is a fine example to the rest of us. And although she is only head of the Anglican Church, I am sure that Wotton's Christians of other denominations will be happy to help celebrate her long reign and give thanks to God for her wisdom and grace.

### The Jubilee and the Oliver Memorial Chapel



Never wanting to leave blank pages, and without enough material to fill them, the two pages of advice from John Wesley may at least provide a little amusement. Outdated? You decide.

### JOHN WESLEY'S ADVICE ON HOW TO PREACH

- Always suit your subject to your audience.
- Do not preach more than twice a day during the week or three times on Sunday.
- 3. Choose the plainest texts from the Bible to preach on.
- 4. Take care not to ramble from your text but to keep close to it.
- Be sure to begin and end at the time appointed... People imagine
  the longer a sermon is, the more good it will do. This is a grand
  mistake... the Methodist rule is to conclude the service within an hour.
- 6. Speak justly, readily, clearly... Clearness in particular is necessary... because we are to instruct people of the lowest understanding... Constantly use the most common, little, easy words (so they are pure and proper) which our language affords.
- 7. Beware of clownishness... Avoid all lightness, jesting, and foolish talking.
- 8. Never scream. Never speak above the natural pitch of your voice.
- Take care to avoid anything awkward or affected either in your gesture or pronunciation.
- 10. Don't just say 'I read only the Bible' in order to preach, read the most useful books, and that regularly and constantly... at least five hours in twenty-four... or return to your trade.
- 11. There is no need to throw away old sermons just because they are old the best can be reused.
- Never preach without doors when you can with any conveniency preach within.

# John Wesley's Directions for Singing

(A selection of advice which he wrote in the index of his publication Select Hymns, 1761)

Sing *lustily* and with good courage. Beware of singing as if you were half dead, or half asleep; but lift up your voice with strength.....

Sing *modestly*. Do not bawl, so as to be heard above or as distinct from the rest of the congregation that you may not destroy the harmony but strive to unite your voices together, so as to make one clear harmonious sound.

Sing *in time;* whatever time is sung, be sure to keep with it.... And take care not to sing too slow....

Above all sing *spiritually*. Have an eye to God in every word you sing. Aim at pleasing him more than yourself, or any other creature.

In order to this attend strictly to the sense of what you sing and see that your *heart* is not carried away with the sound but offered to God continually; so shall your singing be such as the Lord will approve of here and reward when he cometh in the clouds of heaven.
