We all knew that the day would come when Queen Elizabeth the Second would die, but I don't think that many of us could begin to imagine the effect her death would have on each one of us individually, or indeed the Nation and the World.

I think that like so many others, I had begun to see her as immortal, because we just didn't want to contemplate her demise.

Each one of you will have memories of our Queen on which to reflect. Some of you, I am sure, will have actually seen her or maybe have been actually presented to her.

Watching the TV coverage of this past week has been fascinating. So many people have told of their meeting with Queen Elizabeth both officially and at impromptu meetings, often just a wave from a passing Land Rover, but none the less, they have been left with a lasting memory of a cherished Queen. Notably, many children have described her as being like a Grandmother, and adults talk of her great wit and sense of humour, which was never used as a weapon.

I shall remember her as '*The Boss'*, as she was known to all members of the Armed Forces, but, as a priest, I shall remember her exemplary example to us all, as a disciple of Christ. She wore her Faith on her sleeve and not as a *'light under a bushel'* where it would be hidden. Actually, that can be a very difficult thing to do, and many people find it easier to keep their Christianity to themselves for fear of ridicule.

The Queen didn't do that. Instead she decided from the start to put her Faith into action in everything that she did. She prayed daily with her Chaplain, no doubt asking God for wisdom, guidance and strength to make some of the tough decisions that she had to make, not least, regarding members of her own family, but also I am sure that she put everything that she did in prayer to God.

As a result, she never looked down on anyone, was interested in everyone that she met, enquiring and listening intently to them. Many ordinary folk have remarked that in their meeting with her, she always managed to make them feel at ease and left them feeling that during that time, often only brief, that they were only thing that mattered to her. She made time for everyone and put everyone first.

I cannot imagine how she had the physical and mental strength to carry out seventy years of official duties with such dignity and grace – seventy years of selflessly, giving and serving her peoples. A true example of what it means to be a disciple of Christ to us all.

In the Royal sense, the word '*demise*' can be applied to '*transmit a sovereign*'s *title by death*' and I don't think that anyone was ready for the immediate and seamless passing of the Crown from mother to son.

I couldn't help but feel sorry for King Charles as he gave his speech only a day after the death of his mother - no time to mourn, no time to reflect with his brothers, sister or children, just pick up the '*Royal Baton*' and run with it, onto the World's Stage, just as his mother did seventy years ago.

God Save and Bless Queen Elizabeth the Second and King Charles the Third.

has only just begun, and yet looking back (as I write, the children have been in just 4 days) a lot has happened. We've welcomed a new class teacher, Miss Robinson, to the Class 2 position, and new Teaching Assistant in the form of Mrs Buckley; a new Prime Minister has taken up office and now we have a new Monarch – King Charles the Third. King Edward's subjects were Edwardians, Victoria's were Victorians and the numerous Georges ruled over Georgians. As subjects of the new king, we are now either Caroleans (as in Carolean style, under Charles II of England) or Carolinian (as in the Caroline era under Charles I of England). Perhaps someone will tell us soon! These terms are called 'eponymous adjectives', something that I didn't know before the historic and sad events of this week. Our new Reception Year Group has ioined us. a full intake once again. and we are getting to know these 'bright buttons' as they explore school and become familiar with routines. The proportion reaching the Higher Standard or Greater Depth in external assessments is well up on the National results, and although the final, official results are not yet published, early analysis



#### A SUMMER HOLIDAY QUAIL



Hi, I'm Claudie, I'm 13 and I love all kinds of birds. I've raised and released a crow who was

orphaned and I'm currently raising an abandoned pigeon chick not to mention the various garden birds deposited half dead on the doorstep by my cat. But in the main Ikeep quail. I was given an incubator and found hatching eggs online, they came through the post.

Quail are a small, moderately smart species of gamebird, like the partridge. There are approximately 130 species of quail worldwide. If you like birds, you'll love quails, and they make good pets if kept in the right environment. They're super entertaining and fun although you need to have the right male to female ratio, or it could get nasty! One male to four females makes for a happy environment. I started off with five button quails they're one of the smallest species, around the size of a chicken chick. I now have 9 button quail and 8 coturnix quail (a larger more common species). As quail have been domesticated and bred over the years, they've lost the want to hatch their own eggs or raise their own chicks due to stress – as sadly some quail are kept in tight cages with no space to move.

I like to give my quails lots of enrichment such as leaves, grass, logs, and rocks to forage and hide amongst. I feel that mimicking their natural environment minimises stress and keeps the quail active and healthy. I must be doing something right as not only did one of my buttons (Pru) incubate some of her eggs, but she has also hatched them and is doing a great job of raising them with the help of mate Bumble, knowing her instinctively that she can use her feathers as insulators and to find shady spots when it got hot. I also recently found out that quail eggs are more nutritious than chicken eggs - although it does take quite a few to make an omelette!

#### August was a very busy month at Hunts Court. Jenny from Wren's Birds of Prey and I participated every Wednesday, in the HAF



programme from Gloucestershire County and Stroud District Council. The Holiday Activities and Food (HAF) Programme's purpose is to make sure children who are eligible for Free School Meals (means tested) are entertained, active, educated, safe and fed

During the month we had 120 children aged 8-15 years from all over the county booked in for an up close Bird of Prey experience

which involved looking at the various owls, hawks and falcons, learning about their characteristics, habitats, conservation status, prey and care. We also provided craft activities making owl masks, bird colouring sheets and word searches and finished with owl pellet dissection!

between 1st - 26th August.

All this was carried out either side of a delicious two course lunch from Walter including produce from our own garden and local providers such as Laura at Middlewick Farm Meats. Thanks also to Becky Pain and Berkeley Pony Club for the use of their tent for the month, helpful for shade and shower!

We have thoroughly enjoyed the experience with so many engaged and interested children asking fantastic questions with some of them ticking off bucket list wishes such as 'flying a barn owl'!

We are looking forward to providing sessions once again for the Winter HAF programme in December.
